



TEXTBOOK AFFORDABILITY & STUDENT SUCCESS

- Textbook costs have increased dramatically in the last 2 decades
- A body of literature about the impact of open educational resources, access to resources, and student success is growing




STUDENT SUCCESS & TEXTBOOK ISSUES @ ISU

- Spring 2019, ISU Textbook Affordability Committee Student Survey:
 - 73% of students did not acquire a required textbook or other course material due to cost
 - 89% of students delayed purchasing a textbook or other course material due to cost
 - Students use different funding sources to pay for textbooks and other course materials:
 - 32% of students use credit cards
 - 13% use loans
 - 23% use work money
 - 21% use money provided by family
 - 69% purchased a required textbook or course materials that they felt the instructor did not use.
 - Students use a variety of sources to acquire textbooks (**7% use Milner**)

- Textbooks impact key areas that are important for student success
 - Affordability
 - Removing barriers



MILNER LIBRARY eTEXTBOOK PROJECT

Outline of Process

- Faculty select texts for their courses
- Milner obtains textbook data from registrar in aggregate
- Search for availability of institutional license
- Identify High-Impact Texts and prioritize purchases
 - Size of class enrollment
 - Cost to license institutionally vs. Cost for student
- Titles are purchased and activated
 - Faculty members are notified via email
 - Links placed in ReggieNet
 - Access points in Library Catalog
 - Electronic Books guide eTextbook list

MILNER LIBRARY ETEXTBOOK PROJECT

Pilot Project Spring 2021 - by the numbers

- One Time Funding from Milner, \$10,000
- 52 course sections
- 75 titles provided
 - 66 purchased
 - 9 already owned
- 2,029 students impacted
- As much as \$143,880 saved

BY THE NUMBERS ACADEMIC YEAR 2021-2022

Fall 2021

- Funding Complications
 - \$20,000 Academic Enhancement Funds for FY2022
 - \$10,000 spent
 - Milner Librarians spent from their funds, \$2,200
- 207 Course sections
- 243 Titles provided
 - 127 purchased
 - 7 OER titles
 - 109 already owned

Spring 2022


- Funded through AEF
- Approx. \$10,000 spent
- Milner Librarians spent funds
- 207 course sections
- 259 titles provided
 - 127 purchased/upgraded
 - 5 OER titles
 - 127 Already owned

MILNER LIBRARY eTEXTBOOK PROJECT

Limitations

- Many textbooks do not have workable institutional licensing options
 - McGraw Hill
 - Pearson
 - Cengage
 - Macmillan
- Timeline-some classes have last minute changes
- Problems with notifying students-some already bought the book
- Securing ongoing stable funding for project

FACULTY SURVEY

Most important considerations: text quality and relevance, then cost

- COVID a major consideration
- Textbook affordability workarounds reveal the extent to which faculty see this as an equity issue:
 - ✓ Assign inferior texts
 - ✓ Compare editions
 - ✓ Limit number of textbooks
 - ✓ Create alternative assignments
 - ✓ Photocopy / scan / share texts



2. What were the benefits and challenges of using library-provided ebook(s) in undergraduate classes?







